Spanish Ambassador Asks Probe of Jose Marin's Death

ALEJANDRO PADILLA, Spanish ambassador in Washington, has requested Henry Simmon, secretary of state, to investigate the death of Jose Marin, 65-year-old Spaniard, who was found in his cell in the El Paso county jail two months ago, it became known Wednesday. Marin was being held in military confinement. He was charged with the murder of Frank Lyons and H. D. Oppenheimer, El Paso attorneys, in the First National bank building May 21. The Spaniard was found dead in his cell the day before he was to have gone to trial in 34th district court for the murder of Mr. Lyons. Strychnine in stomach. A chemical analysis of the contents of his stomach revealed a large quantity of strychnine, according to Dr. W. W. White. The correspondence from Mr. Padilla was forwarded by Secretary Simmon to Governor Dan Moody, and by Governor Moody to District Attorney Stewart Haskin. In his letter, Mr. Padilla said that Marin was worth half a million dollars 12 years ago. He was reduced to poverty, and was without funds to employ counsel to defend him in the letters said. Mr. Padilla asked that an investigation be made to determine who now has Marin's property. He also pointed out that Marin had been kept in solitary confinement and that the visitors he was allowed to have were forced to talk

He held that position until 1910, at which time he was elected sheriff of San Miguel county, and he served one term in that office. He had been mayor of Las Vegas from 1904 to 1910.

Accident Delays Zepp's Departure



Taylor, of Hat Springs, who is one of the promoters of the project. The dam would be built near Old Caliente, and would impound waters of the Alamoza river. Mr. Taylor is planning to build a dam with funds raised by bonding the lands to be irrigated.
